
Chess Report

enough to gnaw through the outer protective casing of the Brazil nut; amazingly, humans would need a saw! **Miss Walter**


On the Farm Year 1 had a fabulous time

really informative and there was lots of 'hands-on' fun. The children bombarded each visitor with carefully considered questions and learnt a great deal.


