Spotlight ON JAMES AGG

I was a pupil at Berky from 1995 to 2001 and have taught 'cello and bass here for 11 years; life as a peripatetic teacher is interesting as I get to visit many different schools and perform in their concerts. As a Berky pupil, I especially enjoyed all the musical opportunities I was given, such as singing with the Flowers Band - a brass band which regularly performed at the Bacon Theatre - and the Abba Tribute Band which performed at the Town Hall. One of the highlights for me as a nine year old was conducting the School Orchestra in a performance of the Toy Symphony at the Town Hall. I also used to perform at the Competitive Festival (now the Festival of the Performing Arts) each year and bring back a nice, shiny cup!



What do you do in your spare time?

Because I am interested in history - particularly the architecture - I visit National Trust properties whenever I can. I enjoy mechanics and have built a kit car; I also do all the repairs on my own car. I enjoy DIY challenges. I enjoy cycling and recently completed the 'Cycle 300 Challenge' for Cancer Research; since then, I have completed the Le Col Giro Challenge and the Bose Frames Tempo Challenge. I also own a blue tandem in the hope that my wife will be encouraged to join me in cycling every so often. I enjoy hi-fi and home cinema and am for ever developing my ultimate set-up to enable me to get the most out of watching the many films and TV series I like. Last but not least, I have two elderly rescue chihuahuas.

Who were your childhood heroes?

Isambard Kingdom Brunel - for his outstanding contribution to architecture and engineering. Brunel laid the foundation for all that we take for granted today in these fields. I also greatly admire Johann Sebastian Bach for his astonishing musical genius.

What skill would you most like to have that you don't have already?

Definitely welding and wood carving. I would be better equipped to tackle many mechanical and construction tasks and could make ornate items of furniture.

Have you any claims to fame?

Fame is perhaps a little strong but when I was 11, I appeared as a Gryffindor pupil in the film 'Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets'. For 'Friendly and Fun,' we have been learning all about Kindergarten life, the routines and different environments in school. We have found out lots about each other and the children have formed really strong friendships through play. One highlight was everyone working together to create a helicopter from wooden bricks of all shapes and sizes and then spending the day playing together, sharing the resources and revisiting the activity throughout the day. In technology, we programmed Beebots to move in the right direction to find a penguin or polar bear on a snowy landscape and our role play area turned into a frosty explorer's hut. MM

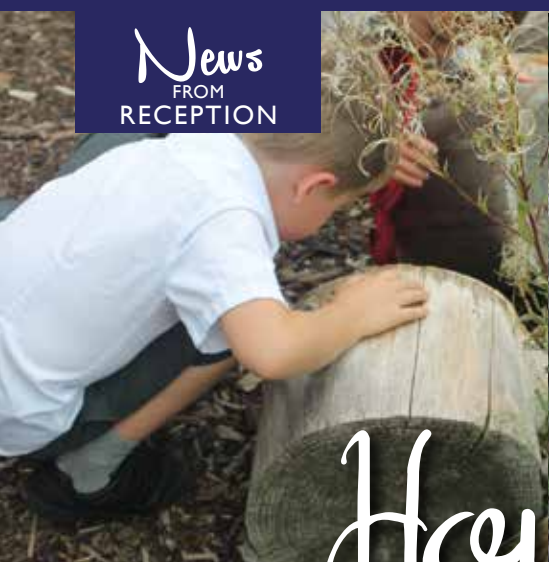


Making friends and loving learning!

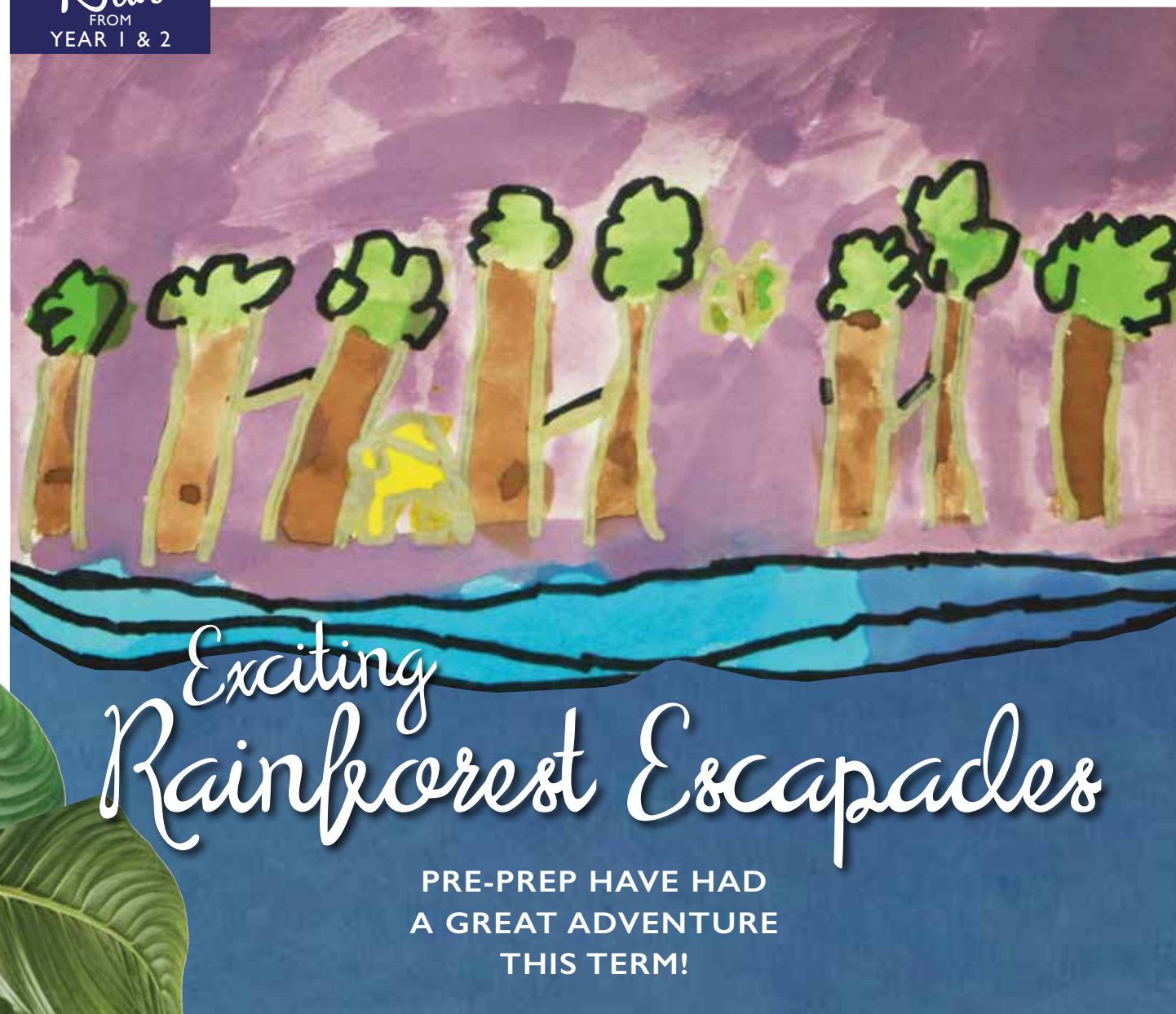


Ohh we go...

Exciting Rainforest Escapades

PRE-PREP HAVE HAD

THIS TERM!

Lots of mapwork helped the children to understand where the Amazon rainforest is located. They discovered all about the Equator and the effect it has on Brazil's weather.

As part of our English, the children found out about the features of non-fiction books. The iPads have been used to find facts about rainforests. They were

fascinated by some of the facts they found! The children then created their own information pages.

Throughout the department, there was an impressive array of rainforest art - pen and ink studies inspired by Amazonian Indian artist Nixiwaka Yawanawa and vibrant paintings of rainforest creatures and plants. Year 1's DT Day was also an opportunity for creative minds to run riot as they were tasked with creating rainforest-inspired dioramas complete with moving animals! Collage, oil pastel and chalk have also been explored!

Year 1 studied famous explorers. The children looked at a book called 'Great Adventurers' by Alastair Humphreys and learnt about explorers like Amelia Earhart and Benedict Allen. They were thrilled to receive a very special video message from Alastair Humphreys himself! He told the children all about his adventures and why he likes exploring the world. He asked them to think about what they would take in their explorer backpacks on a trip to the jungle; some of them wanted to take their special toys from home, but they also thought it would be a good idea to take flare guns, first aid kits and salt to help

clean any wounds they might get. Of course, biscuits and food featured high up on their lists too!

To the huge excitement of the children and staff, we adopted two gorillas; 2L are the proud adoptive parents of Chimanuka and 2T of Mugaruka. They are a pair of rare eastern lowland gorillas and they live in the rainforests of Kahuzi-Biega National Park in the eastern Democratic Republic of Congo. Chimanuka is the leader of a harem of twenty female gorillas; he was the victim of a poacher's snare which caused the loss of one of his hands. The children were then very excited to discover more about gorillas. AS

There cannot be many schools that take broadening the curriculum quite as seriously as Berky does, but we believe that a thorough education should include equipping children to be responsible and capable citizens; with that in mind, for an hour a week, the Prep children take part in a variety of activities which are both valuable and enjoyable and this time is very much looked forward to. Depending on the skills and interests of the staff involved each year, subjects are chosen to encourage the learning of useful life skills and the children have the opportunity to take part

bites and stings, burns, choking and head injuries. She has also discussed how to go about calling for help when necessary. If you have an accident, you will now be in safe hands!

It is always worthwhile learning to cook from a young age and the children really love their annual cooking sessions. Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, Mrs Mitchell has been unable to run this activity this term but usually, every year group learns about food hygiene and preparation and the children soon become confident cooks. They have to work cooperatively, reading and understanding the

Mrs McCreanor's Fun Spanish has been a very worthwhile addition to the Carousel repertoire for Years 3 and 4. It is well known that it is easier to learn languages when you are young so it makes sense to introduce a third language at this stage. As with Pre-Prep French, this is done through Spanish children's stories, songs, rhymes and games. These fun sessions ensure that when more formal Spanish begins in Years 5 and 6, the children already have a strong 'feel' for the language.

Last but by no means least, the children participate in eight weeks of Drama each year.



in each of these for eight weeks before moving on to the next activity in the rotation - hence the name.

Mr Banks has proved to be full of good ideas for Carousel. In the past, he has introduced the older children to the 'Fiver Challenge' to develop their entrepreneurial skills. All sorts of schemes were hatched, resulting in sales of homemade toys, keyrings and bookmarks, drinks and attractively packaged sweets. The children proved to be very enterprising and astute in their investments. More recently, Mr Banks has run Design Technology sessions; making battery-operated fairground rides using dowel, card and MDF involves thinking about functionality and cosmetic details as well as learning to use various tools safely. Always having an eye on the latest resources available, Mr Banks is also using the 3D printer purchased by the PTA and Strawbees, a construction set useful in promoting STEAM education (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics).

A course of First Aid should be on everyone's 'to do' list. Miss Keegan has taught the older children the basics of first aid this term, covering many common ailments such as asthma attacks,

recipes and weighing and mixing the ingredients. There is also the added benefit of something delicious to eat at the end!

In an increasingly stressful modern society, mindfulness activities such as Yoga play an important part in maintaining well-being, giving children effective methods to keep themselves calm and combat anxiety. Yoga is taught by Jay, a professional Yoga teacher. There are also many physical benefits to be gained such as increased strength, flexibility and coordination and an improvement in concentration.

Mrs Sallis's Samba Band is always very popular; Years 3 and 4 learn focus and collaboration from this exciting music-making, watching intently in order to know what to do next. It is especially valuable for those who don't play an instrument or who don't play in an ensemble. The Samba Band performs at the annual Easter Concert and the children's huge enthusiasm for this activity is always very evident. This year, instead of Cookery, the older children have been taking part in group Music Composition work with Mrs Mitchell. Again, this demands a great deal of collaboration as well as creativity and the results have been ringing round the Prep building!

The huge value of Drama is often overlooked in favour of more academic aspects of English; however, it encourages many useful life skills, the most obvious being how to speak clearly and confidently in public. Participation in Drama involves self-control and discipline and the ability to cooperate with others; it prepares children very effectively for a world which is increasingly team-oriented. Drama develops empathy through thinking deeply about the characters portrayed - their motives and ways of thinking. All these skills enhance the children's approach to subjects which require insight into human nature and interaction - such as English and History - thus helping to create responsible and sensitive citizens for the future. Finally, Drama is physically active, creative and fun!

This term, the Year 3 children - who missed out on the Year 2 Summer Production due to the lockdown - are using their Carousel time to work on my musical 'Rats!', the idea being to record it for Christmas viewing by the rest of the school community. The children have absolutely loved this opportunity to immerse themselves in acting, singing and playing.

INTERNET SAFETY

Internet safety is incredibly important to us here at Berkhamstead, and we believe that teaching your child to be internet savvy in this digital

world is as essential as teaching them to swim. With this in mind, children here are taught to be safe on the internet from Kindergarten; the messages are reinforced regularly and built on as the children get older.

Visits from outside speakers and special assemblies are a regular feature of our CWB curriculum; this term, for instance, Year 4 benefitted from a brilliant online and fully interactive assembly called 'Be Internet Legends,' a collaboration between Google and Parent Zone. Using iPads, the children went on an adventure exploring a virtual land called 'Interland' to learn about issues such as cyberbullying and creating secure passwords. Meanwhile, Year 6 children were visited by our SchoolsBeat police officer, PC Fiona. She came in to talk about their online life and the importance of keeping personal information private. One of the activities required the children to look at made up online profiles to observe the mistakes other children had made. She also talked about 'PEGI' games ratings and impressed on the children the importance of not meeting up with strangers and reporting anything online that makes you feel uncomfortable.

MUSIC NEWS

We were thrilled to be able to start some of our music groups as the term progressed. Using our largest rooms, Chamber Ensemble, Berky Bows, Percussion Ensemble and Jazz Combo all started their rehearsals again. As always, the groups are new this year and vary according to the instrumentalists' level of competence. 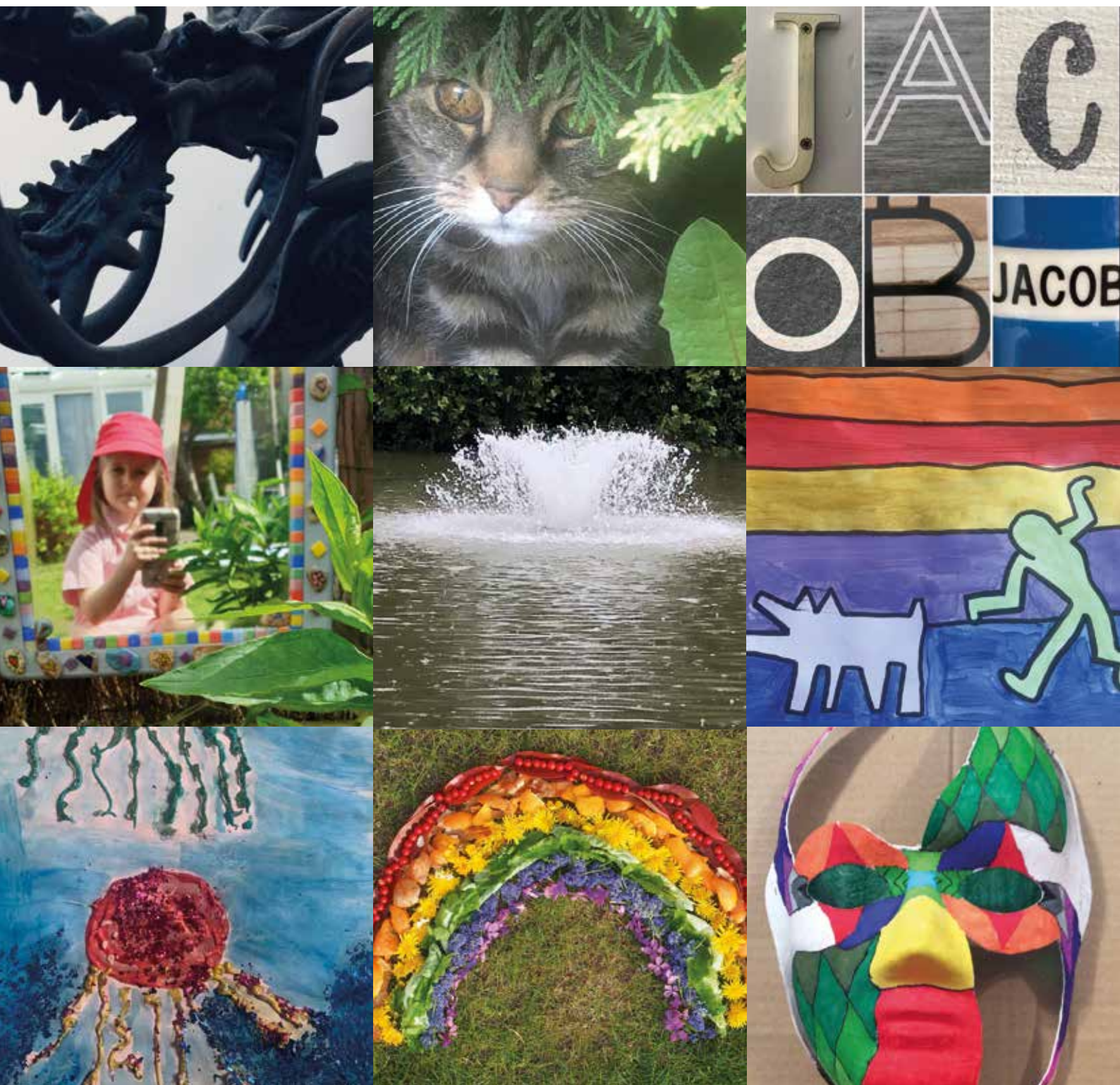

PREP **ART** IN LOCKDOWN

DESPITE BEING FORCED TO LEARN FROM HOME,
CREATIVITY CONTINUED TO THRIVE IN OUR PREP SCHOOL'S
ART DEPARTMENT DURING LOCKDOWN



Reflecting the situation of the other subjects here at Berk, Head of Art Mrs Bareham continued to provide her pupils with art classes online and taking place in virtual classrooms instead. Teaching was now delivered via Microsoft Teams and, mirroring a real life art room situation, Mrs Bareham's lessons often began with her demonstrating artistic techniques, such as drawing and painting. The inspiration for Year 3's learning was Impressionism, Year 4's topic was 'figures' (inspired by Keith Herring and Lowry) - and they also produced artwork to celebrate World Oceans Day - Year 5 concentrated on self-portraits and Year 6 immersed themselves in the creation of masks and art to celebrate VE Day.

The Prep School children enjoyed their topics and produced truly beautiful art, but Mrs Bareham found that the children got through their work more quickly at home than they would have done in the classroom. Many pupils were devoting plenty of time to art, possibly as an antidote to a rather unsettled time caused by the pandemic. And rather than let the situation stunt her pupils' learning, the ever-resourceful Mrs Bareham - typical of a Berk teacher's ability to adapt to change - embraced the opportunities that learning from home offered; she encouraged her pupils to make the most of their extra time and artistic inclination and to express themselves by learning a new visual art form - Photography! They were allowed to use whatever camera they had at home, so some children used parents' phones and iPads and others had access to cameras.



Mrs Bareham's lockdown photography lessons were all about composition. She taught the children how important it is to consider how the elements of a still life photograph are put together to make the picture more interesting. She covered angles, and the children had to think about whether they were taking their picture from above, below or face on, and to

consider whether the photograph was a close-up or not. One of her most popular projects was all about letters. She asked the children to search their surroundings for the letters that made up their names, and she was thrilled with their resulting creativity. She enthused, "I was really impressed with what the children produced in lockdown, and I was delighted to be able to introduce photography lessons. That said, I share my colleagues' relief at getting back into the classroom - it is wonderful to be back!"



SHOWCASING PUPILS' WORK

Our annual Summer Art Exhibition showcases a piece of work from every pupil in the school and is always a crowd-pleaser. Although - along with a host of other Summer term events - it couldn't take place this year, Mrs Bareham put together two online art exhibitions comprising pieces from every pupil from Years 3 and 4, and from the older pupils in Years 5 and 6. The latter included work from this year's talented Art Scholar Viera M.

Inspired by the impressive photographs taken by our pupils in lockdown, we also ran a Photography Competition. Every child in the school could enter; Mrs Agg and Mrs Taylor had the difficult (but hugely enjoyable) task of judging the superb work, everyone was given a prize and certificate for entering, and the four winners were awarded a canvas of their photograph.
