Spotlight ON AN PARKER

Ian Parker has recently joined our teaching team. After three years living in the USA where he was a stay-at-home dad, he returned to the UK and began teaching. For the last ten years he has taught a variety of year groups and subjects. He is enjoying bringing his passion for teaching to Berkhampstead, and teaches Year 3 as well as games and parts of the Carousel.

Some of Mr Parker's Year 3 pupils put him to the test with a number of questions:

What did you do before you were a teacher? I worked for a charity called

Guideposts Trust where I ran their friendship scheme. This required me to find volunteers to support adults with learning disabilities to participate in sociable and fun activities.

What are your favourite things to do?

I love all things to do with sport and travel. Most of my weekends are spent coaching rugby, and I coach Cheltenham North Under 9s (which my son Zack is part of), and the Girls' Under 15s (which my older daughter Evie plays for). The girls have recently reached the last 16 of the National Cup which means we need to travel further around the country.

What is your favourite country that you have visited? I am very lucky to have travelled lots. When I was 18, I took a year out and travelled around the world. To choose my favourite place is very tricky. I am fortunate that all three of my children and my wife love skiing as much as I do so a skiing destination would probably be my choice. However, we are all huge Disney and Marvel fans, so a trip to Florida would also be very high on my list.

How many pets do you have?

I have two cats. One is a boy and he is called Dizzy because he is not very clever and the other is called Dotty because she has dots on her fur.

Have you ever done anything adventurous?

he inspiration for the History Mystery came from themed birthday parties I organised for my own children many years ago; unlike swimming parties or visits to Softland, these were held at home and were based on games played at children's parties when I was young - for example, I reinvented Musical Chairs as The Mystery of the Disappearing Toadstools! The guests loved the opportunity to be imaginative and found the idea of going on a quest to solve a mystery, such as where the treasure was or how to vanguish some evil villain, irresistible. Every year, they eagerly donned costumes, were put in teams by means of the first activity, then played an assortment of games each leading to the next through maps, messages and clues until the desired goal was achieved.



Once my children had grown up, creating something similar for the Year 2 children was a small step - a themed day of connected challenges based on the term's history topic. The educational value was indisputable; while thinking they were just having fun in fancy dress, the children would actually be practising their skills in reading, comprehension, writing, maths, problem solving and feats of memory, as well as working together as a team and discovering more about the relevant historical period - quite an intense day of learning!

The first ever History Mystery was based on the history of London. The children pitted their wits against Colonel Thomas Blood, a notorious character who attempted to steal the Crown Jewels from the Tower of London in 1671 and, surprisingly, was pardoned by King Charles II. The children had expected to begin the day sticking jewels onto brooches they had made previously, but to their horror, when they opened the jewel box, the jewels were gone; in their place was a taunting letter from Blood...

The next History Mystery was set in Victorian times and involved Charlie Peace, a cunning Victorian thief who carried the tools of his trade - burglary - in a violin case. The scoundrel, with his violin case full of the children's missing jewels, was eventually discovered in Mr Cross's office and proved to be none other than the Bursar!

Subsequent Mysteries were based on Boudicca's struggle against Roman invaders and a different Victorian Mystery in which Sherlock Holmes and Dr Watson were helped by the children – participating as the 'Baker Street Irregulars' to overcome Holmes's nemesis, the dastardly Moriarty. Moriarty had stolen important plans from various eminent Victorians; the children had to recover them as well as repair Mr Brunel's bridge which Moriarty had destroyed. At Christmas, the Prep children had their own History Mystery for the first time; their mission was to discover the true meaning of Christmas

and transform the miserly Scrooge into a more caring and generous person while also learning about the history of Christmas. As reward, they received chocolate coins from Scrooge's own coffers.

By far the most whimsical Mystery, though, was inspired by the children's investigation of the history of Space exploration, an offshoot from a broader study of the 1950s and 1960s. When their spaceship broke down, two aliens named Zig and Zog landed on Earth and borrowed the bodies of Mrs Agg and Mrs Owen for the day; the children had to help them find an element needed to mend their spaceship. Ignorant of the ways of humans and, unfortunately, the school rules - the aliens caused havoc, but the children showed them what to do and how to behave, especially at lunchtime! The element discovered, Zig and Zog blasted off back to their home planet, leaving Mrs Agg and Mrs Owen very puzzled as to what had been happening in their absence...

This Spring term, the Year 2 topic of 'Castles' gave rise to the planning of a castles-themed History Mystery. Unfortunately, Storm Eunice and Covid 19 resulted in two very disappointing and frustrating postponements; however, the day will be rearranged for next term when all the knights and ladies of Berkhampstead will be ready to assist the children on their special mystery quest. Quoting our school motto - Perseverantia Vincit - seems most apt at this point!

It is always fascinating to see which children get completely absorbed in the imaginative and dramatic aspects of the day. These children totally believe in the historical and fictional characters portrayed, they totally believe that they must overcome the 'baddie' and they are thus hugely motivated to participate in order to complete the quest.

While everyone really enjoys the day complete with appropriately-themed lunch - these particular children gain so much from 'living' their characters.

Finally, History Mysteries involve a huge amount of preparation and no discussion of them can conclude without mention of Mrs Taylor; without her incredible dedication and hard work, they could never happen. WE ARE CELEBRATING OUR 10TH BIRTHDAY THIS YEAR, AND WE MARKED THE OCCASION WITH A FABULOUS PARTY!

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When Berkhampstead Day Nursery first opened its doors in 2012, there were just six children and four members of staff in two rooms. The intention was to create a Day Nursery that reflected the values of the highly respected Berkhampstead School, and to extend the 'Berky' experience to the very young. Berkhampstead was founded by Edna Andrews over 75 years ago as a 'happy and nurturing place,' and here at the Day Nursery, we are always mindful of this.

Our enviable reputation soon spread, and the Nursery quickly grew, we now have up to 140 children - from three months to school age - attending each day, and employ 30 staff to look after them! We boast five spacious and stimulating classrooms, a soft play room, a library and a sensory room. Our outside space is also noteworthy. We have an outdoor classroom, and a spacious, specially designed Early Years playground, with a fun climbing hill, a large covered sandpit and water trays. There are opportunities to get messy in the 'mud' kitchen, and the large scale construction area provides a great space for imaginative play. We also have a dedicated area for the Under 2s; a great outside space provides an abundance of learning opportunities, so our smallest children can benefit from resources such as a music wall, wooden chimes, a balancing bridge, stepping stones, a dear little kitchen area and a chalk board for mark-making.

During our 10 years, we have been inspected twice by the Independent Schools Inspectorate (in 2017 and 2019), and both times the inspection team deemed us 'outstanding' in all five areas - the highest possible grading. Both inspections highlighted the happy and nurturing atmosphere deeply satisfying that our vision and ethos for the Day Nursery is being fulfilled.

Congratulations to Mollie and her team -Happy Birthday, Berkhampstead Day Nursery - here's to the next outstanding decade!

t the beginning of the Spring term, we started our topic 'Families,' and had lots of fun in our role play area. It is always interesting listening to the children's conversations as they recreate real life situations, and demonstrate that they are kind and caring. The children were invited to bring in their favourite story, and we enjoyed listening to why they had a particular favourite. As part of the Prep School's Platinum Award, a pupil from Year 6 visited us to read stories to the children - they were completely engaged and looked forward to her weekly visits.

Our creative interests led us to learn about Pointillism, and the artist George Seurat. To recreate his technique, the children dipped their fingers in paint to build up and mix colours to create pictures of trees, flowers and rainbows.

During Children's Mental Health Week, we thought about being calm and peaceful through practising mindfulness. The children had access to quiet spaces and glitter bottles, and calmly watched the glitter float from top to bottom. We followed simple yoga routines and listened to music whilst we lay very still with a teddy on our tummy and watched it rise and fall with our breaths. Circle Times centred around emotions and what makes us happy. We thought about our facial expressions, and the children took it in turns to pay each other a compliment. We all agreed that everyone felt brilliant after kind words!

For our topic of 'Spring into Life,' we have been caring for caterpillars, watching them change and grow into butterflies. The children enjoyed helping to feed them, and once they were big enough, we were able to move them to an indoor communal butterfly garden. Eventually we set them free in the Wildlife Garden. To better understand changes in nature and how plants grow, we planted some runner beans and watched how the roots grew below the soil and the shoots grew up towards the sun. The children named the runner beans Beanie, Bella and Jack, and we had a competition to see which one grew the fastest. MM

Reception children have travelled... Fait, Far, Away

ur topic 'Far, Far Away' - which centred around traditional fairy tales - has provided wonderful opportunities for storytelling and drama this term. The stories' simple construction and repetitive patterns are very accessible, and thus most appealing to the children.

Each week, the children were introduced to a new story, and these included 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears', 'Little Red Riding Hood' and 'The Three Billy Goats Gruff'. We looked at the characters, the characters' homes, the morals of the story and the typical lay out and sequence of traditional fairy tales. During the topic there were some fantastic opportunities to retell the stories using story maps, pictures, story actions and puppets, and ultimately to write their own story! The children loved experimenting with materials to ensure the Big Bad Wolf could not blow down their houses, creating a new bridge for the Billy Goats Gruff to escape the Troll, designing their own troll using iPads, and making and tasting porridge!

Our topic 'Growing' led the children up a beanstalk to an exciting land where they became expert horticulturists, artists, and authors. They explored a variety of stories such as 'Jack in the Beanstalk,' and 'Jasper's Beanstalk,' and they also explored non-fiction.

The children then had a great time planting beans, observing the changes as the beans grew, and learning how to care for them. Using Andy Goldsworthy as inspiration, the children became artists, creating their own Goldsworthy-style pictures using a variety of natural resources such as sticks, conkers and stones. During the busy term we also celebrated Children's Mental Health Week, World Book Day, Mothers' Day and Easter! Early Years could not end the Spring term without a party. All the children participated in a variety of Easter games, had an 'egg-cellent time,' and agreed it was a great way to

end another successful term! H R-W

his term, Year I has been on safari to the fascinating continent of Africa. In English, the children came up with

some very creative lists of what they would pack in their backpacks for a trip to Africa. They then heard the lovely story of the Ghanaian Goldilocks and compared it to Goldilocks and the Three Bears. The

children also did some research and wrote fantastic fact files on Nelson Mandela.

We learnt all about Kenya - where it is, its typical weather patterns, what they have in Kenya - and we compared our own lives to life in Kenya. The children put their navigational skills to the test by using their compass knowledge on maps to find safari animals. Then we learnt about life in Ancient Egypt and the various ways that Egyptians used the River Nile. The children also learned about Tutankhamun and hieroglyphics, which they found fascinating.

Art has been incredibly colourful this term with the children creating sunset silhouettes, some awe-inspiring paper kente weaves and African collar necklaces using pasta as decorations. The children really enjoyed making thumb clay pots, which they carefully and meticulously designed with African-inspired patterns.

Based on our African theme, the children attended a brilliant workshop and decorated their own African Mask, sculpted from Albesian wood. They also learnt an African dance routine, which they all performed superbly at the end of the session.

The children's hard work and knowledge of Africa was showcased in our fabulous Year I assembly. It went brilliantly, with the children teaching their parents all about Africa, performing the dance that they learned during the workshop and enthusiastically performing their own composition of African music.

Africa has been a really exciting topic for the Year I children and they have thoroughly enjoyed exploring it! JM







Castle Capers!

his term Year 2 have been transported back in time to explore medieval castles in Britain. Features of a castle have been studied and the children were eager to use the iPads to find out facts about how castles were defended and attacked. The school was full of knights and medieval maidens when we found out all about jobs within a castle. The children discovered all about various roles and had to apply for a job within a castle. Hot seating for interviews made us realise that actually, despite being brave and skilled swordsmen, we did not want to become knights! Inspired by the castle theme, the children created their own stories filled with exciting story language, plenty of description and interesting plots! The children were amazed when their stories were tied together to make their own books, which Year 2 thoroughly enjoyed reading to Reception children on World Book Day.

Paul Klee inspired the children's art work. After studying his 'Castle and Sun' the children created their own collage castle and water colour masterpiece using a range of techniques and effects. Towers were created with clay and the children were fascinated to see how the kiln works. Their wonderful, glazed turrets and battlements can be found on display in the classrooms.

Of course, we had to visit a castle. Our trip to Warwick Castle was a highlight of the term as the children experienced first-hand what it was really like to live and work in a castle. AS

AUGMENTED REALITY

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With technology at our fingertips, there are endless exciting opportunities to enhance our teaching here at Berky, and with this mind, recent additions to our Computing equipment have included the purchase of Spheros, Kubos Robots, MacBooks, Crumbles and Micro Bits. Never one to stand still, Head of Computing, Mr Banks constantly rejigs and improves the computing curriculum, and has introduced 'Augmented Reality' to Year 6's computing lessons this term. Augmented Reality (AR) involves adding computer-generated graphics into the live view of a phone camera - or in our case, a tablet - so that the children are able to feel as if there are objects in the classroom that are not actually there. This happens in real time and enables children to learn in a more interactive way. Our oldest pupils have been loving these lessons, and have used AR very imaginatively to recreate scenes from fairy tales. They have also built bridges to carry a truck from one side of a road to the other using AR! There are plans to use AR in more lessons, across more subjects and in different age groups: imagine learning about the organs of the human body and being able to interact with the heart, on a space in front of you without the mess! Using AR models of the heart, the children can look inside and follow the tubes to the chambers. Watch this space for further

developments!

o commemorate the school's 70th anniversary in 2015, Mr Cross launched his own junior version of it the Platinum Award. It embraces the school motto, Perseverantia Vincit, (Perseverence Wins), and was aimed at our oldest girls and boys in Years 5 and 6. Our pupils are quite used to having successes applauded within school, but Mr Cross felt it was time to spread the net further, and to celebrate the achievements of the children who also participate in a huge range of activities outside school. However, rather than completing the award overnight, it

the Duke of Edinburgh Award, and named was designed to take a few terms to encourage children to learn to commit to a project.

The award is all about creating a thirst for adventure and having a go at new challenges. Its aim is to develop healthy lifestyles, community spirit and resilience, qualities that we believe are fundamental in developing happy, focused and successful children. All-round achievement is the key to this award rather than mere attainment, and it should be a fulfilling and joyful experience; over the last few years it has certainly captured the children's imaginations. Children who wish to take part are given their own logbook to track their progress

in four areas: Volunteering, Physical, Skills and a Residential Adventure or Expedition. Volunteering is all about choosing to help others or causes. These could be the community within or outside school, the environment or perhaps helping look after animals. All children in Year 6 have leadership responsibilities, but they are encouraged to develop this role to achieve the award. Some listen to younger pupils read, (current Year 6 pupils, Oscar, Lucinda and Zoe are enjoying doing just this), while others in the past have, for instance, helped elderly neighbours with everyday errands. Lucinda is also keen to raise money for the Alzheimer's Society as her grandmother suffer from dementia, and Manas has volunteered with Cheltenham Open Door - and last Christmas - Gloucester Royal Hospital's paediatric ward.

Meanwhile, Jacob, one of our brilliant Year 6 eco-warrior leaders, collected all his neighbours' soft plastic every week for a month.

To pass the Physical section, the children must undertake two activities. These might be hockey or dance, rock climbing or archery. Ena is planning to set herself walking and running challenges, (while simultaneously raising money for The National Deaf Children's Society and Steps - a hip dysplasia charity) while Zoe is swimming, cycling and walking 354km - which is the length of the River Severn! The children know that they must commit to these activities for at least three months - always remembering the school motto - Perseverantia Vincit. Learning a new skill is always a challenge. Many children are keen to learn a second musical instrument or to pick up a new sport, but we have also had more unusual ideas such as sushi making or making jewellery. The aim of the Adventure section is that the children must undertake their two adventures or expeditions over two years in Years 5 and 6. These can be school residential expeditions, or adventures that happen out of school. The children record their activities in the logbook which, once completed, they present to Mr Cross. If he chooses to give them their award, they are given a certificate, a t-shirt and a badge to wear on their blazer. And at speech day, the pupil or pupils with the most impressive logbook are presented with a trophy.

Mr Cross has been delighted with the uptake over the last few years and enthuses. "I have been thrilled with the quality of the logbooks that the children have produced. I knew that we had many talented and intelligent children at Berky, but I now also know that we have many who are determined and considerate and who show perseverance. This Award has shown many of our pupils what is possible with regard to developing new skills, improving fitness, supporting others and having adventures." Mr Cross is looking forward to seeing Year 6's completed logbooks later this year.







THE COMMANDERY

As part of our study on the Stuarts, the Year 5s enjoyed a wonderful visit to the Commandery in Worcester.
