

### ...SPOTLIGHT ON...

Mrs Meredith-Smyth is our Head of Early Years and a Reception teacher, who started teaching at Berkhampstead at the beginning of the Autumn Term. She already knew the school well, as previously she had been one of our governors. She lives with her husband Nick and daughter Eden and their beloved dog Ruby. She did her BA (Hons) in Bath and her postgraduate certificate in education (PGCE) and Early Years Initial Teacher Training (EYITT) at the University of Gloucestershire.



My first job was as a waitress in a hotel when I was 15.1 continued to waitress all the way through sixth form and university. I loved chatting to the customers and working at weddings!

#### Did you always want to be a teacher?

When I was four years old, I used to line my teddies up and read them a story. I am incredibly lucky that I have had some truly amazing teachers who have inspired me. I still remember my first day in Reception and finding my name on my drawer. When I finished my A Levels, I wanted to be a fashion journalist or a writer and pursued working in PR for a while. #### **PROBLEM SOLVING**

Our pupils sharpened their mathematical skills in a brilliant problem solving workshop run by retired maths teacher, Mr Ede. The children - from Years 2 to 6 - were tasked with solving geometrical puzzles - many of them hand-crafted by Mr Ede - in what proved to be a superb way of helping the children improve skills such as reasoning and spatial awareness.



he good news is that inspections have undergone a significant change. The new inspections are certainly no less rigorous but Inspectors now try to make the inspection experience more positive and constructive. While for the youngest of our pupils in the Day Nursery, there is still a one-word judgement given, for the rest, this has been replaced by detailed reports of the inspection findings in five areas: Leadership, Management and Governance, Quality of Education, Training and Recreation, Pupils' Physical and Mental Health and Emotional Wellbeing, Pupils' Social and Economic Education and Contribution to Society and Safeguarding. Recommendations for further improvement are also made. From a parent's point of view, this still indicates whether all the relevant standards are met; it also means some reading is required in order to form a balanced judgement.

Schools know when an inspection is imminent - they come roughly every four years - so the Berkhampstead staff were waiting for the Monday morning call telling them that the inspectors were arriving the next day. Short notice indeed! The call duly came on November 27th, four years after our previous inspection. Even though we knew that we had addressed all the recommendations from the previous inspection, had retained our Gloucestershire Healthy Living and Learning and Mental Health Champions accreditations, had introduced many exciting new academic and pastoral initiatives and had worked ceaselessly to be the best school possible, it was still a stressful time. Would the inspectors understand the type of school we are? Would they appreciate what we do? Would they manage to amass the appropriate evidence in just three intense but short days? Even though this was her first term in her

new role as Head of School, Mrs Bareham remained remarkably confident, calm and serene which helped the rest of the staff to feel similarly. In the Day Nursery, ably led by Mollie Dodds, a similar calm confidence was evident; the staff there also felt well-prepared and positive. Everyone knew that they had worked consistently hard to create the best learning environment possible; they were also keen to get the inspection done and dusted before Christmas!

Six Inspectors duly arrived and spread themselves around the three sites and the scrutiny began. By Thursday evening, it was all over and a draft report written which was read to Mr Cross (Executive Head), Mrs Bareham, Mollie Dodds and the Governors, all of whom were thrilled with the very positive outcome. However, the report still needed to be verified, so the contents had to remain confidential. In February, the long-awaited final report arrived.

The Inspectors spoke of the school in glowing terms. They appreciated our 'happy, caring and fun' learning environment and 'broad and balanced curriculum, suitable for pupils of all ages and abilities', particularly highlighting that 'pupils make rapid progress in developing their ICT skills in areas such as coding'. They could see that children were enabled to 'deepen their knowledge, skills and understanding whilst gaining independence and developing skills for life'. Management and governance were described as 'effective' and 'wellinformed' and policies and procedures were seen as 'appropriate' and 'carefully reviewed'. The Early Years department was praised as 'a welcoming and supportive environment' in which children 'engage actively in their learning and with curiosity'. They commented that 'teachers know the children well, and plan activities which engage their interests'. They witnessed the 'effective teaching of phonics',

the 'varied and stimulating playtime activities which develop their creative and collaborative skills' and noticed that 'children are excited when they arrive at school'.

when they arrive at school'.

The Day Nursery was delighted to achieve the top grade of 'Outstanding' in all areas: Overall Effectiveness, Quality of Education, Behaviour and Attitudes, Personal Development and Leadership and Management. The 'high-quality educational programmes' were described as 'well-planned' and 'highly effective', based on children's learning needs and interests. All children were considered to be 'extremely well-prepared for the next stage of education' and, most importantly, the children were seen as happy - learning 'important values' and how to be 'polite, kind and to persevere.' It was abundantly clear to the Inspectors that the Berkhampstead ethos and aims underpin both School and Day Nursery.

The strong pastoral care and robust safeguarding culture in both School and Day Nursery was also noted; Inspectors commented on the clear culture of care which promotes pupils' self-knowledge, selfesteem and self-confidence' and felt that the promotion of kindness as a core value has a clear impact on their [the children's] attitudes and behaviour'. They felt that 'pupils' behaviour is of a high standard and they have a clear sense of right and wrong'; they observed that 'on the rare occasions bullying occurs, it is addressed effectively', staff applying the behaviour policy 'consistently and fairly'. In summary, the report states that 'All the relevant standards have been met'. There were so many positive statements - too many to recount in this short article - but the full report is available on the School website. Well done to everyone - staff, pupils and parents - for such a successful outcome!

#### **LOTS OF LEARNING!**

Every day is packed full of fun, engaging and educational activities for children at the Day Nursery, and our youngsters benefit from specialist teaching from the school's MFL and Pre-Prep music teachers, Mrs McCreanor and Mrs Sallis; French is taught to our oldest children, the Wise Bears, and all of our children enjoy Berky Bear Music with Mrs Sallis.

Learning opportunities are further enhanced by the extra-curricular activities we offer. The Teddy Bears and Fuzzy Bears welcome specialist company Drama Tots each week. This is a drama, music and movement class, planned to encourage young children to use their imagination, improve their communication and language skills and to have fun - all in an environment with which they are familiar. With Sarah's inviting collection of props, puppets and instruments - and her exuberant way of delivering her classes - her visits are much anticipated by our youngsters! Didi Rugby is another popular visiting class, and an optional activity for our over 2s. Coach Keith teaches the children skills such as sharing and taking turns, and helps them develop mobility, agility and confidence - all in a non-competitive and fun environment. It takes place on the school's MUGA or in the Andrews Gym, depending on the weather:

### A JOURNEY OF DISCOVERY

We had such a cold start to our Spring Term, but this did not hinder our enthusiasm. We enjoyed our STEM week with Mr Banks and the Year 6 children teaching us how to use Spheros. We made some intricate marble runs and studied the artist Andrew Goldsworthy to make lots of amazing models from natural and manmade materials.

We celebrated National Storytelling Week with everyone bringing in their favourite story, which provided an eclectic range of stories to share. 

Our pupils asked some intelligent questions about the building, and we learnt about the services at the church and about meetings that happen during the week to help the members of the church. We then went to visit St Matthew's on the other side of the road. This church was built when the congregation at the Minster had outgrown the building. The children were able to point out the differences between the two church buildings and saw how the space in the church could be used differently, with different styles of worship. We also learnt how the church is linked to churches in Sweden, how it helps women in South America, and also how the church feeds over a hundred people in Cheltenham, giving them free food, shelter and warmth.



#### CHELTENHAM LADIES' COLLEGE

Year 5 were invited to Cheltenham Ladies' College to experience some secondary school science investigations. Their sessions were led by Mr Gill, the Head of Science, and were based on Patterns in Chemistry.

Mr Gill led with a discussion about what the pupils already knew about patterns in science, then proceeded with a demonstration from the periodic table showing that as you added lithium, sodium and potassium to water, they became more reactive.

The pupils were then invited to have a go at their own investigations, mixing a variety of chemicals together and noting patterns that were created.
