EXCITING OUTDOOR DEVELOPMENTS FOR THE DAY NURSERY



children are naturally drawn to playing outside, and there are numerous benefits to doing so. Playing outside is fun, exciting and important for children's learning and development. Outdoor play improves a child's mental wellbeing and self-esteem - and happy children are what we strive for from the earliest age here at Berkhampstead. With all these benefits in mind, we were eager to develop our already excellent outdoor provision, and after months of careful planning - and plenty of hard work - in June, we unveiled our new, rather fabulous Discovery Garden.

The generous space is made up of a number of key areas based on the Nursery's belief in the 'Curiosity Approach.' (This is an approach to Early Years learning which encourages a child's natural curiosity and imagination.) The areas have been designed to be exciting, to develop imaginations, to provide an opportunity for the children to express themselves freely, and to encourage an appreciation of the natural world. Above all, the playground has been designed to be really fun!

The Water Station is an exciting structure made up of funnels, tubes, pipes and jugs. The aim is to encourage the children to test out their their own ideas by experimenting with 'open-ended resources.' (Open-ended resources are everyday items - such as water and pipes - that can be used in a range of ways). The benefits of teamwork are learnt for instance, we see children holding pipes for one another whilst their playmate pours water from the jug the small team then joyfully watch the travelling water together. Communication and social skills are consequently encouraged.

Needless to say, the Construction Area appeals to plenty of the children who enjoy role play. There is a gravel pit for digging and imaginative play, encouraged by props such as hard hats, high-vis jackets, spades and wheelbarrows - great fun!

The Mud Kitchen is another super area for imaginative play. With its exciting concoction of stones, soil, leaves, pinecones and real pots and pans, the children have tremendous fun mixing their own magic potions and mud pies!

Physical development is encouraged by the brilliant Wobbly Path. It has been crafted from tyres and balancing beams and is beneficial for the children to practise their physical skills. We love watching the children praising one another as they navigate the path without falling off!

Dinosaur World is a fun, small world area for the little ones to explore. This area will change to reflect the children's interests, so could become a fairy world, for instance, or a farmyard. Whatever its guise, young imaginations will be stretched in this area of the playground.

The aim of the Planting Area is to encourage the children to appreciate and learn about nature. Discovering the needs of plants is a fascinating learning opportunity for our youngsters. Already the Wise Bears have planted sunflowers, cucumbers, tomatoes and herbs.

Day Nursery Manager Mollie is delighted with the new outdoor provision and enthuses, 'We are thrilled with the Discovery Garden - the opportunities to learn are countless. We can already see such huge benefits to the children: new interests have been ignited, and we have witnessed improved language skills. It has been such a worthwhile project.'

Never one to think, 'That will do', Mollie is already planning new additions to the play area, one of them being a fabulous Berky Bug Hotel!

Our second topic, 'Percy the Park Keeper' was a huge success. The children loved the varied activities and staff enjoyed overhearing the different role play scenarios. 'The Rescue Party' was one of the children's favourite

stories - they acted out their own versions including all the Kindergarten children needing rescuing instead of the rabbit! The children noticed that the animals not only looked different, but they had different personalities, which led us to think about how we are all unique and what our strengths and weaknesses might be. The children's enthusiasm inspired us to make hedgehog cakes using mint sticks for spines. Yum!

The Kindergarten concerts, the trip to Cotswold Wildlife Park, and Sports Day were all so much fun with the children making the adults extremely proud of their impeccable behaviour. MM

Taking learning Outcloors By Gill Agg

he pandemic has had many adverse consequences, but it has also brought about some phenomena which were nothing short of miraculous. No one will forget the mountain goats trotting through the deserted streets of Llandudno, enjoying the freedom of a quieter world, and this was no isolated incident: there were similar occurrences world-wide. Many more people also started tending their gardens, growing their own vegetables and enjoying outdoor spaces during this stressful time. To me, it seemed the birds sang louder and the world was a better place -I wished this new, more tranguil world could be here to stay, but it seems we are now 'back to

normal' with our busy lives, intense pollution production and general domination of the planet.

While parents undoubtedly want the best for their children, 'the best' has traditionally been equated to academic success with the expectation that children should spend each day glued to their desks in order to learn and improve; however, some Gradgrind-inspired education is far from what is on offer at Berkhampstead. Our teachers are well aware of the value of outdoor learning, and we are lucky enough to have various spaces in which to enjoy what is - ridiculously - a relatively new concept in education.

Since we are situated within the town, we do not have the luxury of our own forest; however, we can plan forest school activities which can achieve similar results - for example, developing communication and problem solving skills in a relatively free setting which gives children

opportunities to assess risk for themselves, encouraging a positive attitude to learning, nurturing an appreciation of, and respect for, the natural environment and just having a great time den building and playing with mud. Also, there is much indoor learning that can take place just as well outside. The Early Years department has a wonderful outdoor space for exploration; very young children learn best through their senses and physical experiences, and it is lovely to see their chalk marks on the walls and paving stones round the Andrews Centre, their clay models adorned with leaves, sticks and stones they themselves have gathered, their leaf prints and rubbings and their nature crowns...and the birds are always grateful for their fir cone feeders!

Outdoor learning doesn't stop after Early Years. Studying nature through a magnifying glass, hunting for minibeasts, looking at and comparing different habitats, pond dipping,

the consideration of animal life cycles and observational drawing continue throughout the school. The Day Nursery children also benefit from regular visits to the school garden; they especially enjoy seeing the hundreds (yes, really!) of frogs which visit the pond in early Spring, resulting in thousands of tiny, squiggling tadpoles. 'No pick, no lick, be careful with a stick' is an important life lesson learned from the youngest age! Gardening is the ultimate in outdoor learning and offers many cross curricular opportunities. Someone once said, 'Gardening adds years to your life and life to

your years' and this is undoubtedly true. In these

technological times, it is a relief

to take the children away from

their screens and out into the

fresh air, to encourage them to

flowers and herbs and discover

their uses, to help children to be

responsible for keeping the plants

grow healthy vegetables and fruit,





alive and to show them the food chain at work through watching the various wildlife visitors to plants and pond. Gardening is a wonderfully cooperative activity. Above all, there are scientifically proven physical and mental health benefits - it is stress-free and active, and it builds up those important Vitamin D levels. Nature certainly has the power to heal; I am reminded of Colin and Mary in Frances Hodgson-Burnett's book 'The Secret Garden' and how those children changed and grew physically, mentally and spiritually through spending their days outside. Year 2 Gardening Club has spent many happy hours weeding and planting and all wish that there was more time to do this valuable work – what's not to like about working as a team and feeling calm and fulfilled?

On the Prep site, Nancy B's winning design is gradually being transformed into a reality a new Wellbeing/Eco Garden named the Jubilee Garden by the pupils which can be entered through the back door of the Wellbeing pod; this will provide the older children with an opportunity to develop their gardening skills, as well as being a venue for lessons such as reading, mindfulness or Circle Time and a quiet space at break time. Already, the Year 6 children have created their 'legacy' artwork - eight wonderful animal and plant mosaics for hanging in this new haven of tranquillity.

Finally, tending a garden is an eco-friendly thing to do, helping the whole planet in a small but vital way. Surely gardening should be seen to be at least as important - and useful - as learning to use an iPad.

The Summer 2022 exhibition was a huge success, and we look forward to seeing more of the fantastic efforts of our pupils next year.


























ART SCHOLARSHIPS
