Mr Jones joined Berky in January 2023 and teaches in the Pre-Prep department, in Year 2. He worked in student support in the Higher Education sector after graduating university, before retraining to become a primary teacher in 2011. What are your initial impressions of Berkhampstead School?

What qualities do Berky children have?

I think this is an impossible question to answer, as the word that immediately comes to mind is unique! Berky children love to show enthusiasm for areas that interest them and, as a school, I'd like to think we encourage and support them in doing this. So yes, while we strive for pupils to show perseverance, thirst for knowledge, confidence, resilience and kindness; embracing the individual is key and that really shines through at Berky.

What hobbies do you have?

I love sports, and play and watch football regularly. I was born in Southampton and have supported the Saints since I was 5, so I try to visit St Mary's a few times each season. I also love cooking; in fact, one of my heroes is Gordon Ramsey - what a talented guy! However, my biggest love is music, so I can often be found bouncing around the kitchen, trying to 'influence' my children by playing them my favourite songs and bands!

What is your favourite book?

My favourite books are Philip Pullman's Dark Materials trilogy. They are the most incredible books with rich, complex characters and such depth of feeling; I can't even think of the ending without getting a lump in my throat! In fact, I love them so much, we almost called our daughter Lyra, before eventually settling on it as her middle name - she's actually called Alice, after Lewis Carroll's eponymous character.

What is your dream?

As a youngster, I dreamed of becoming a professional footballer, but I think that ship has now sailed. As an adult, I've settled for a slightly more grounded dream; going into space! You never know...'

THE BENEFITS OF **BRINGING CHILDREN** & THE ELDERLY **TOGETHER**

/ hat better way to kick off celebrations of the King's Coronation bank holiday weekend, than with a quintessentially English afternoon tea party? The kind-hearted Day Nursery folk, always up for a party, decked out their marquee with red, white and blue balloons and bunting, asked the kitchen to bake special Coronation fairy cakes, and invited a group of elderly friends from Oakhaven Residential Care Home for a session of Coronation-themed arts and crafts followed by afternoon tea.

The super gathering resumed the Day Nursery's collaboration with Oakhaven for in-person get-togethers after a hiatus due to Covid restrictions. Before the pandemic, the Day Nursery regularly visited Oakhaven for shared activities such as arts and crafts, carol singing and Berky Bear music sessions with Mrs Sallis. And during the pandemic, their elderly friends were not forgotten, as there were shared zoom calls and letter exchanges. Happily, this term, Berky Bears Music also resumed, when the Wise Bear children visited in May.

Staff at both Oakhaven and the Day Nursery have witnessed the tangible benefits of the intergenerational initiative, from 'magic moments' shared between the elderly and toddlers to physical and mental improvements for both generations. Staff at the Day Nursery are very positive about the link with the care home and have witnessed the children developing empathy and respect for their elderly neighbours as well as improved communication skills. Stigmas about care homes and growing old are also combatted. 'Seeing the children create precious moments with the elderly residents is wonderful, raves Day Nursery Manager, Mollie Dodds. 'The get -togethers are beneficial to both generations.' Staff from Oakhaven are just as positive about the collaboration, and enjoy witnessing the joy in their residents as they interact with the children. Claudia Ehler is the Activities Coordinator at Oakhaven and enthuses, 'When the children visit, our residents often forget their physical limitations, lean up out of their chair, extend a hand and a smile whilst engaging in conversation, song or play; they very much look forward to spending time with the children."

Needless to say, everyone is delighted that Berky Bear music sessions at Oakhaven will now take place monthly, and that the popular arts and crafts will happen as much as possible too.



ur topic of Julia Donaldson stories was a big hit with our Kindergarten children. The books are so familiar to the children, they have loved joining in with us to retell the stories and have enjoyed bringing in books from home to share with their friends. Our role play area started as a Gruffalo cave, and lots of amazing storytelling with descriptive language could be heard through play. Julia Donaldson's books gave us many opportunities to learn about rhyme, with the children making up their own rhyming strings and playing games such as rhyming snap.

We linked this topic to Forest School sessions where the children learned the first rules of Forest School "No pick, no lick and be careful with a stick". We went hunting for minibeasts and listened for as many different natural sounds as we could whilst sitting quietly on a log enjoying the outdoor space.

We loved celebrating the King's Coronation, and emjoyed our party day, complete with games and a delicious picnic with our families.

The last term is always bittersweet as we say goodbye to children as they move on to their Reception classes, but our topic of 'Fun in the Sun' was exactly as it sounds; we enjoyed every moment together. The children gave ideas on what they would like to learn, and this time our role play became a beach, complete with sand, buckets and spades, shells and a rock pool. When playing, the children can be heard reliving their own holiday experiences of splashing in the sea, jumping over waves, finding creatures in rock pools, eating ice-creams and picnics on the beach: so many enjoyable experiences to be remembered.

The last couple of weeks, disappeared in a frenzy of Early Years Concerts, a Sports Day, and our Pom Pom Party. Well done to all our children for participating; you have made us extremely proud, and you are now ready for your next adventure! MM






eception have spent the Summer Term finding out about different countries, and we started by exploring our local area. We went on a walk of the area around school and identified the different types of houses we could see. We also spotted different landmarks, including Cheltenham Town football ground! The Coronation of King Charles III inspired us to find out all about the early life of the King including his hobbies and interests. We then took a tour of the UK, comparing London to Cheltenham and discovering the different traditions celebrated in Scotland. The children were interested to learn about the patron saints of the UK, especially the legend of St George and the Dragon. Finally, the children discovered what homes were like in the past and compared them to the homes of the present.

After half term, Reception spread their wings and took off and travelled around the world! First, we landed in Antarctica. The children became weather reporters and informed us all about the snow storms and freezing temperatures and created some wonderful printed igloos. We then jetted off to summer climes, visiting Australia, India and Africa where we created some Australian art, tasted Indian food and choreographed our own African dance. We finished the term by writing our own jungle stories.

The Reception children enjoyed their Outdoor Learning afternoons. They enjoyed digging in the Wildlife Garden and exploring a range of different nature-themed activities. In June, we participated in '30 Days Wild.' Reception children complete this challenge annually with the aim being to get closer to nature and value the world around us. PROMOTING CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S WELLBEING IS A KEY PART OF KEEPING THEM SAFE, HELPING THEM DEVELOP AND ENSURING THEY HAVE POSITIVE OUTCOMES INTO ADULTHOOD. (PUBLIC HEALTH ENGLAND, 2021).

Historically, the British are renowned for their 'stiff upper lip' – their brave and stoic reaction to adversity; this attitude was considered so commendable that anyone behaving otherwise was scorned or even liable to punishment, as exemplified by the shocking fate of deserters in the World Wars. People, particularly boys and men, were expected to 'man up' and keep their emotions firmly under control; this expectation caused innumerable people lifelong unhappiness, often with serious consequences. With such an ingrained attitude of regarding mental problems as weakness of character, it has been a long, slow process of change, but at last we are progressing - mental health is a hot topic nowadays!

Wellbeing is a combination of physical, mental, emotional and social health, and parents and educators are very aware of their responsibility to foster it in their children. No longer expected to be 'seen and not heard', children have rights and are listened to; we value our young people and recognise the importance of building their self-esteem and confidence. In today's high-pressure world where stress is a fact of life, strategies for achieving wellbeing are actively promoted, and this has to begin at school.

At Berkhampstead, much is done to empower children to look after their own wellbeing. First, there are discrete lessons. All the children regularly participate in Circle Time and have weekly CWB (Citizenship and Wellbeing) lessons focusing on a whole range of important life skills and moral values. The younger children are taught the language they need to express their feelings; using aids such as the Colour Monster, they begin to recognise and label their different emotions. Many initiatives have been introduced by our superb Deputy Head Mrs Bareham, such as the three Schoolbeat visits for Year 6, Skillzone trips for Years 4 and 6 and the Online Pupil Survey used by all Prep children to voice their opinions on a range of social and pastoral matters. Berkhampstead was also one of the first schools to achieve the GHLL Mental Health Champions accreditation, a much coveted award that we still retain.

There are also more subtle ways in which wellbeing is encouraged - for example, talks in assembly, Anti-Bullying Week activities, raising money for charity, opportunities to work collaboratively both with peers and other year groups, opportunities for leadership including the School Council and Eco Committee, and a constant focus on kindness and empathy rewarded each half term with the Gill Agg and Sally Lee Kindness Cups.

The lovely Prep Wellbeing Pod, designed by Mrs Bareham and filled with many topical books and equipment, is always there for any children who need some quiet time away from the crowd.

However, there is a downside to the new seriousness with which the subject of mental health and wellbeing is treated: there is the risk of wrapping our children up in cotton wool so that they experience as little stress and unhappiness as possible. The fact is, life is difficult and there will always be problems and hurdles to overcome; we are doing our children no favours by protecting them completely from tricky situations. It is by learning strategies for coping that we encourage children to build their resilience and mental strength. There are robust policies and procedures in place to protect children - now we need to give them empowering techniques and strategies to fight their own battles.

Inevitably, though, things happen which cause children major upset, such as a change in family circumstances, cyber-bullying or national - and even global - events, such as the Covid-19 pandemic, the terrifying issue of climate change, the Russian invasion of Ukraine or the devastating earthquake in Turkey and Syria. All the Berkhampstead staff see pastoral issues as a top priority and there are always adults on hand who will listen, help and advise. Several children have ongoing mentors - special oneto-one people - either due to adverse home circumstances or to more general feelings of anxiety. There is also a visiting Play Therapy expert who, as well as giving informative talks to parents - part of Mrs Bareham's 'Keeping Parents In The Loop' initiative - provides weekly one-to-one sessions for children in need.

The proof of the pudding is in the eating, so they say. With its truly holistic education, Berkhampstead more than fulfils the aims of the Five Ways to Wellbeing - Keep active, Take notice, Connect, Keep learning and Give. Here, strong, trusting relationships are quickly built between staff, pupils and parents. It is evident that the children are very aware of what constitutes good health (both physical and mental) and that they soon learn to articulate their thoughts and feelings, thoroughly preparing them for when things go wrong; happy children engage most effectively in learning and, when equipped with sound strategies for dealing with tricky situations, they are well prepared to deal with life's inevitable challenges. 






SUMMER ART EXHIBITION


