rs Leigh is one of our new Year 2 teachers. She taught English to Y5 and Y6 last academic year, covering Miss Evans' maternity leave; having previously worked in Year 2 on supply, she already knows the school well. She gained her BA (Hons) in Leicester and her Postgraduate Certificate in Education (PGCE) in Lancaster. She lives with her husband Steve, three children and her hilarious dog, Ruby.

What did you do before Berky?

I have taught in four different Cheltenham schools over the last 27 years. Before that, I worked abroad for a year, then in a busy city library before completing my PGCE. My first job, when I was 14, was as a waitress which I was not very good at but enjoyed as I liked chatting to the customers!

Did you always want to be a teacher?

My early ambition was to be a journalist, and I wrote for my college magazine and took a Media Studies course where we had fun making and editing videos (it was a long time ago!) What do you enjoy about teaching?

Walking our border terrier, Ruby and taxiing my children to different places takes up plenty of time but I love to read and bake whenever I can. I enjoy watching live music, visiting the cinema and catching up with family and friends.

A GARDEN FULL OF WONDER: OUTDOOR LEARNING BLOOMS AT CHARLTON KINGS

he new Wise Bear garden at our Charlton Kings Day Nursery has been completed, and it's already proving to be a popular space. Thoughtfully designed to inspire curiosity, creativity and a love of the outdoors, the garden enriches the children's learning through exploration, imagination and hands-on play.

Manager, Katie Hawkes is delighted with the space: "The new garden provides a wonderful range of outdoor learning opportunities. We've planted a variety of flowers in wooden planters to create a beautiful sensory experience as soon as you step outside. We're also growing vegetables, giving the children the chance to experience the joy of producing their own food while learning how things grow."

A highlight is the bark kitchen - perfect for messy, creative fun. With mud, water, herbs and sand, children can invent potions or whip up pretend meals. Wooden log seats around a table encourage collaborative and imaginative role play.

At the top of the ramp, a cosy enclosed area with rugs and pillows invites quieter play. With access to books, drawing materials, puzzles and den-building resources, this space supports early literacy and mathematical thinking in a calm outdoor environment.

The mud-filled, uneven ground further into the garden is ideal for climbing, digging and balancing, supporting children's physical development. "This is such a rich space for exploration," says Katie. "The children love scooping mud, building with wood, and using ramps and vehicles. One of their favourite spots is the tree stump - a stage for singing, dancing and spotting passing buses, all sparking conversation and curiosity."

Tuff trays filled with miniature scenes and story prompts are dotted around the garden, offering hands-on opportunities for imaginative and narrative-based play.

A simple but empowering touch is the boot storage area. "Having boots ready and accessible encourages independence," says Katie. "Children can decide when they want to be outside - whatever the weather. We want them to grow up believing there's no such thing as bad weather, only unsuitable clothing!"

With so many opportunities to explore, create and discover, the Wise Bear garden has already become a cherished part of daily life at Charlton Kings.

PICNICS, PLAY & PLENTY OF IMAGINATION!

e all enjoyed a fabulous Teddy Bears' Picnic to mark the fantastic achievement of filling our pompom jar! We ate a picnic lunch with our cuddly friends and had a wonderful time spending the day exploring bear-themed activities.

Forest School has continued to be a huge hit! We've enjoyed getting creative with nature rubbings - using leaves, bark and flowers to make beautiful artwork – and we've been on scavenger hunts, searching for natural treasures. Of course, no Forest School session would be complete without a visit to the mud kitchen! The children have 'cooked' some delicious creations. From mud pies to leafy lasagna, their imaginations have run wild.

As the weather warmed up, we took the opportunity to learn all about sun safety. Through stories, songs and activities, the children now understand why it's important to wear hats, apply sun cream, and find shade when playing outside. It's all part of helping them make healthy, safe choices while still having fun in the sun.

Our creative station has been a hive of activity. One of our favourite projects was making handprint giraffes. We also made our own sensory bottles. The children chose colourful glitter, buttons, beads and sequins to fill their bottles, and added water and oil to create calming, swirly effects. These bottles have been a great way to support mindfulness.

The children also loved creating treasure maps, complete with Xs to mark the spot of the hidden treasure. This activity sparked so much imaginative play; it's been wonderful to see their storytelling skills flourish. ROARSOME LEARNING IN RECEPTION! hroughout the Summer Term, fascinating extinction theories. The Wilson Museum in Cheltenham lent us

We loved learning about the differences between carnivores and herbivores and the

air-dry clay in our art lessons with Mrs Hartley. We also created a collaborative Jackson Pollock style canvas which became a backdrop for our charcoal dinosaurs. These look simply stunning! Our literacy this term has also been dinosaurthemed! We have focused heavily on non-fiction texts, learning about their features, but also looked at fiction, like 'Katie and the Dinosaurs' and 'Tyrannosaurus Drip'. The children's progress in writing this term has been phenomenal! We have been so impressed with the independence and fluency in writing.

In maths lessons, we have been looking at sharing and grouping, and what happens when we have something left over! We have been working hard on our problem-solving skills,

building some solid foundations in preparation for what the children will encounter in Year 1.

MIGHTY OAKS

he saying 'Mighty oaks from little acorns grow' is so true of our school which celebrates its 80th anniversary this year. When Mrs. Andrews first opened her little school in the front room of 'Berkhampstead' - her home in Cleeve View Road, now the Prep building - there were just 22 pupils; her vision for the school was one of children's happiness being of paramount importance - since happy children learn most effectively - and their teachers being dedicated,

caring, inspiring and knowledgeable. This is still the vision of the muchexpanded Berkhampstead 'empire' of today, which consists of a thriving school - with over 260 pupils housed in three different building complexes and two excellent Day Nurseries which share the Berky ethos, one nearby in Pittville Circus Road and one slightly further away in Charlton Kings.

Rather appropriately, an 80th anniversary is known as the 'Oak' anniversary. Like Berky, oaks develop deep, sturdy roots. They symbolise strength, dependability, endurance and wisdom. Our crest, proudly displayed on various items of our smart uniform, shows a stylised tree growing in the

sunshine and bearing fruit. Beneath this tree is Mrs. Andrews' oft-quoted motto - Perseverantia vincit (Perseverance wins through). It is also a key feature of the rather unusual and special short film on our website, created by an ex-Berky parent and her husband. The film begins with an animation of this same tree growing in the sunshine, giving parents of prospective pupils an accurate 'feel' for our nurturing school and the truly holistic education it offers.

To continue the analogy, in the same way that oak trees provide food and shelter for a wide variety of species. Berky's broad and varied curriculum caters for a broad and varied group of children. Whilst we strive for, and achieve, academic excellence as demonstrated by our consistently excellent results both in the 11+ exam and the Independent School entrance and scholarship exams - we also recognise that children have many different strengths and interests and we actively foster these; as well as having their own clubs, subjects such as music, drama, art and sport are included on the weekly timetable and any achievements in areas not catered for within school – such as horseriding or synchronised swimming - are regularly recognised and celebrated within assemblies. Last term, our UTI girls' netball team won 8 through to the final of the IAPS competition.

This term, Berky children won a remarkable number of cups, medals and certificates for Verse Speaking and Drama as well as for various musical performance classes at the Cheltenham Festival of the Performing Arts.

Music holds a special place at Berky. A musician herself, Mrs. Andrews recognised the immense value of music in education and her emphasis on music continues to this day, as demonstrated by the regular recitals for players of all levels, and the marvellous Spring

Concerts at the Town Hall in which all children from Year 2 to Year 6 performed; these showcase both the enormous variety of music ensembles on offer and the incredibly high standards achieved year after year. This year, two pupils even gained places in the National Children's Orchestra, while another pupil won a place in the National Children's Choir.

Although Mrs. Andrews' essential vision remains, it is obvious that the school has also developed, grown and adapted in order to deliver an appropriately modern, up-to-date education. There is a huge emphasis on mental health and wellbeing and Berky was one of the first schools in the area to achieve the Gloucestershire Healthy Living and Learning award, which it has managed to retain to this day. We also hold the Mental Health Champions award. Perhaps the most obvious difference to

the education now is the inclusion of ICT; our provision has kept well ahead of the game, using technology to enhance and enrich the children's learning. Children can use the wealth of devices on offer to draw, paint, compose and play music, photograph, design, code, write, record and present. The ICT curriculum changes from year to year as new technology is developed so Mr. Jones, Head of ICT, has to keep his finger firmly on the pulse!

I am sure that Mrs Andrews would be delighted to see that her beloved school again has a female Head Teacher.

At a recent event, I met TV horticulturalist and ex-pupil Camilla Bassett-Smith who told me that her years at Berkhampstead had been some of the happiest and most formative of her life; I have frequently heard this sentiment expressed and the many ex-Berky pupils who choose Berky for their own children (and grandchildren) further attest to this. I so look forward to seeing the first 4th generation pupil joining us!

Thus, our much-loved school continues to go from strength to strength, constantly adapting through the years without ever losing its original core values; here's to another 80 years of learning, nurturing, growth and development here at Berkhampstead!

MARY ARDEN'S FARM








YEAR 6 PHOTOGRAPHY WORKSHOP




YEAR 6 VINEY HILL
