NEWS FROM THE HEAD

Dear Parents,

It is always interesting to see the school from the point of view of a prospective parent... or a prospective pupil. On Tuesday when a five year old and his parents were being shown round, there was so much of interest for them to observe. PC Silsby, an ex-parent of the school was visiting Year I with his assistant Lorelei, an ex-pupil. Some of Year 2 were out on the MUGA with Miss Keegan learning how to play tag rugby while the rest were learning about Hanukkah; we also stopped off in the Den to look at their beautiful clay castles drying out ready for firing in the kiln. Down in the Lab, Mr Morphew and Year 3 were experimenting to find out the absorbency of different materials and, as we emerged from the basement and peered through to see what was going on in the kitchen, chocolate crunch was promptly offered for sampling! There was much going on in the Prep too, the highlight being the Year 5 I.T. lesson in which the children were programming a set of Spheros – mini App-enabled robots which look a little like headless BB8s (from Star Wars) - in the hall with Mr Banks. At the end of the tour, when asked if he had any questions, our little visitor promptly replied, "How long is your waiting list?" For me, though, the best thing about taking people round the school is seeing how confident, friendly and polite our children always are towards visitors - they showed genuine interest in the little boy and involved him in what they were doing. Education is not just about academic learning.

Yesterday there was another excellent example of the older pupils sharing their learning with the younger ones. Mr Banks and a class of Year 6 children took the Spheros over to share them with the Reception children - a very satisfactory session all round! Next week, the Spheros will be continuing their tour around the school; the rest of Year 6 will be visiting Kindergarten and Years 1 and 2 will also have a chance to take their turn.

There was one particularly notable achievement this week. Mrs Holland took a team of four Year 6 children to compete in the UK Maths Challenge at Cheltenham College; there were about twenty schools from Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire and the challenges were tough. However, the team of India, Sophie, Oscar A and Noah were true to the Berkhampstead motto - 'Perseverantia vincit' - and emerged the runaway winners of the event. Finally, I am delighted to let you know that I have appointed Ben Edwards to the role of Bursar from the 8th April. Ben is currently Assistant Bursar (Finance and Operations) at Concord College in Shrewsbury. He was previously in the RAF and was Estate Manager at Brize Norton. News from Early Years...

A group of local fire fighters visited the School on Monday to teach Early Years children about fire safety and what they should do to prevent a fire. The children had a lovely morning learning about fire engines and even became trainee firemen using the hose!

There was great excitement in Kindergarten this week when we had a visit from Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service; two firefighters talked with the children about their job and answered questions the children had thought

of earlier:

The children learned about the importance of smoke alarms, practising for our school fire drill and 3 rules...

Get Out, Stay Out Call The Fire Service Out! Next all the children tried on a firefighter's helmet whilst sitting in

the fire engine and then held

the hose to wash the school windows and minibuses. Finally we stood well back whilst the horn and siren were sounded: what a noise!! I was enormously proud of the children as they behaved beautifully, and the firefighters commented on how sensible and lovely our children are.

The children listened to the story "Katie and the Starry Night' where Katie goes to see an exhibition of Van Gogh paintings. She climbs into the Starry Night painting and begins her adventure! The children were so enthralled with the story they created their own Starry Night pictures using a similar technique to Van Gogh. Van Gogh would have been so proud of the children's interpretations of his Starry Night painting! Please come and visit our art gallery along the corridor!

The children listened to the story 'How to Catch a Star'. They sequenced the story using a time line - beginning, middle and end. They made a story map to share with their talk partners to help retell the story.

The children and staff have thoroughly enjoyed this topic and the children have decided our next topic will be 'Our Favourite Stories'. They will be asked to choose their favourite stories and what they would like to find out and learn about the topic.

Sports report...

However, the College began to play with more confidence in the third quarter and the long balls were finding their mark. The College pulled ahead to 8-1.
