News from Early Years...

Welcome back! We hope everyone had a lovely holiday. The children have returned to school happy and eager to engage in all the exciting activities they have planned with staff.

We are looking forward to the 'New to Reception' sessions on Mondays and it will be good to meet the children. Tea or coffee and cakes will be served in the gym. All parents are invited to come and meet other parents.

Early Years children and staff are practising for our Summer Concert; 'The Three Little Pigs and the Big Bad Wolf.' The children are very excited about their parts and Mrs Sallis has been busy teaching them all the songs and actions. Reception children are busy learning their lines - thank you for your support with helping your child learn their lines.

During Early Years assembly on a Wednesday, two children from each class will be awarded a certificate (in a form of a leaf) for living Berky's values! The children will put their leaves on the relevant branches (honesty, kindness, perseverance, trust, and politeness) of the tree; each term they will take the certificate home. The children's names will be announced in the Newsletter alongside Early Years news.

The Pre-School children are being encouraged to be more independent within the setting ready for Reception. The children are very excited, and their sights are set on completing all challenges by the end of this term

The children had a fabulous time exploring the castle grounds, learning about life in the castle and watching amazing historic events unfold. News from around the school...

READY, STEADY, GROW!

This term Year 2 have been studying plants in their topic 'Ready, Steady, Grow'. They have enjoyed a visit to Batsford Arboretum and have become very knowledgeable about how plants grow and reproduce. They have now moved on to learning more about pollination and how amazingly clever bees are! On Monday we had a visit from a member of the Gloucestershire Bee-keeping Association who taught us all about his hobby - we learnt so many new facts.

YEAR 4 VISIT THE CHELTENHAM SCIENCE **FESTIVAL**

Year 4 had a lovely morning at the Cheltenham Town Hall on Thursday.

On arrival we went to the Hartpury Science Hub. Inside the tent we were able to experiment with their thermal camera, experience what it is like to ride a horse, test our reaction speed and play the drums!

Then we went into the Crucible tent where we had a presentation about uncovering the invisible. The scientists discussed many things in our world that we are unable to see such as x-rays, radio waves, heat and gases around us. They did several experiments: making smoke rings, knocking plastic cups off heads using air and looking through a microscope to see microscopic spiders crawling over cheese!

We then completed a trail around the gardens based on a variety of animals from the Mantis Shrimp to Peregrine Falcons.

Finally we went into the Discover zone. Many companies and universities helped our pupils to complete their own investigations from making circuits, playing with Virual Reality, looking at

micro-organisms to cracking codes (GCHQ).

> The science festival is a great event in Cheltenham that we really enjoyed. It is running over this weekend. We heartily recommend you visit it.

The bee-keeper showed his special protective suit to the children; it had an integrated hood and 'mask' so that the bees couldn't get inside - however, they could still sting through the material - and sometimes did! He explained that he was first stung 47 years ago and had a severe reaction so had to go to hospital, but he ignored the doctor's advice to give up bee-keeping and has been doing it ever since - he has developed an immunity to the sting now.

He explained the different role that the bees have in their hive and the importance of the queen bee. As he was talking, Jacob said that he could hear buzzing - and sure enough, he was sitting next to a closed case which was housing about 1000 bees! The children were then able to observe the live bees in a sealed observation unit and could spot the queen bee because she had a yellow spot painted on her body which signified that she was born in 2017 (queen bees born this year have a blue spot – it's an international code).

The children were completely engaged and asked lots of interesting questions; they have become bee experts!!

Finally we were also able to taste honey from local hives. Most children loved it, but a few were reluctant. We compared the local 'mixed flower' honey to a pure heather honey which fewer children liked!

This afternoon was the perfect start to our busy period of rehearsals for the Year 2 production 'Bees' which shares a key message about the vital importance of bees and how humans must do their best to promote their survival.

CRICKET

UIIA v St Edward's Won by 4 wickets St Edward's 105-8 Berkhampstead 106-6

The UTTA team continued their good season with a victory against St Edward's. Our opponents batted first and struggled to score in the first half of their innings due to some accurate bowling and excellent fielding by the Berky boys. George R had an excellent spell, bowling twelve consecutive dot balls. Soon wickets began to fall with Andrew, Rhys, George de B-T and James S all gaining success. Adam was excellent in the field, taking three catches. St Edward's closed their innings on 105 for 8.

Our boys batted sensibly and were ahead of the run rate from the first over. Luke batted solidly for 12 and was well supported with a super knock from Charlton of 14. Coming in at number 4, Adam took the game away from St Edward's with a quick fire 31, which included two sixes, one of which he hit out of the ground. Benji and Andrew saw us through to victory in the sixteenth over, with Andrew hitting the winning run. Berky finished on 106 for 6, winning by 4 wickets.

UIIB v St Edward's Berkhampstead 298-4 St Edward's 234-5

ROUNDERS

UII v Rendcomb College Won $15\frac{1}{2}$ - $7\frac{1}{2}$

'Top pitches' at Rendcomb is a glorious sight when bathed in sunshine as it was for the under IIA match. This was a tremendous all-round lesson in how to bat, bowl, run between the posts, make the correct decisions and field at a very high level. Berky batted first and after a slowish start the girls put their foot on the gas and started to connect with the ball and it went sailing out into the deep field area. Two whole rounders were scored by Zoe and one each by Sarah and Ella with many half rounders. Our total came to 8 rounders after the first innings. Our fielding was then completely amazing! Three catches by Emily, Mollie and Florrie with great work between Mollie at backstop and Alice on first post got seven of their players out. Their score was 5 rounders so still close enough to be a slight concern. In our second batting innings it was Florrie's turn to score 2 whole rounders with Alice and Emily scoring one each. Our total was a fantastic 15 1/2 rounders. If the fielding was very good in the first innings it was even better in the second. Numerous stumpings at first post, and another catch by Mollie meant that the whole Rendcomb team were out after only 19 of the 27 balls. This match was super to watch from every aspect and the girls are to be congratulated on a spectacular performance! The final score was a convincing win by 15 1/2 rounders to 7 1/2.

U9A and B v Hatherop Castle 11½ to 10½ win

After a late start at the Victoria Ground (which was bathed in sunshine), this combined A and B team match began... and goodness, what a close match! For the first innings, an U9A team batted and then fielded against the Hatherop team. It was not a good start to say the least and after the first 4 balls, there had been no score, but a loss of two girls - one caught out and one stumped. It did pick up, however, and after some excellent hits and running from Becky (21/2 rounders) and Phoebe (11/2 rounders) and a further one from Bella, the score at the end of the first innings was 5 rounders to Hatherop's 41/2. The second innings saw the U9B girls take their turn and the score gradually crept up with a series of half rounders. The tally was also improved by some poor bowling from Hatherop which led to the B team completing their innings with a total of 6½ rounders and a combined Berky total of 11½. Hatherop needed 7½ to win, but after some super fielding and excellent decision making by Berky, this was prevented. Their final score was 10½ rounders and so it was a close Berky win. Hatherop's late arrival meant a delayed start but the Under 8's first match of the season finally got underway. An excited Red team batted first in the bright sunshine with some big hits straight away. This, along with some enthusiastic running, meant they soon scored some complete rounders; Uma first, followed by Jennella and Aurielle. Uma went on to score three more complete rounders and a half, making her the high scorer of the afternoon. What a great start!

Some lucky catches for Hatherop meant we lost some good players early on in the game but the Red Team held it together to score a fantastic nine rounders in this first innings. It was then our turn to field. A bit of a nervous start meant we gave away a few half rounders but Rosemary soon settled into her role as bowler. After a few reminders to stump their posts, the Berky girls put in a good effort fielding, with Elodie and Hannah stumping their posts consistently, preventing Hatherop from scoring all but two complete rounders.

Running considerably late, the second innings had to be shortened. We ended up batting first again with some more big hits from Uma as well as Holly and Beatrice. Fielding, we again gave away a few half rounders but there was some good decision making from backstop Beatrice which meant Hatherop had little chance to score any complete rounders. An excellent effort all round with a very satisfactory win and final score of 13-11. Well done U8s!
